A NOTE FROM KAHU AKANA

Announcing "Alan Akana Gallery"

Dear Members and Friends of Kōloa Union Church:

For several months, I have been looking for an ideal space to open an art gallery in Koloa to feature my watercolors. My motivation is that I want to share my gift of painting the beautiful flowers of Hawaii with more people. My son Palani will set up and manage the gallery, hire additional workers as necessary, and then find his replacement as gallery manager when he leaves at the end of this coming summer. Even though I found a couple of really good spaces, I have not been able to secure any of them in a timely manner. Therefore, I asked the Church Council at our January meeting and then the Congregation at our annual meeting for permission to open the gallery in the living and dining room area of the parsonage. I am very grateful for the Congregation's unanimous vote in favor to host the gallery at the parsonage for up to six months!

I will remain working full-time at the church and painting on a daily basis while Palani runs the gallery. I have also agreed to the terms of receiving 49% and the church receiving 51% of the net profits of all sales at the parsonage for every full month in which the gallery is hosted at the parsonage. This way, the church remains the primary financial beneficiary of the

gallery and will not risk its tax-exempt status at any point. I will also purchase a small business insurance policy for liability and property damage.

As I consider some of the spaces in the area where I have inquired or made an offer, I am confident that one of them will become available in the next six months. In the meantime, I am deeply grateful to have use of the parsonage on a temporary basis and look forward to sharing my art of Hawaiian flowers with even more people!

Please visit the gallery on our grand opening on Sunday, February 26, from 1-5; and drop by and bring friends after that during our regular gallery hours: Sunday 1-5 and Monday through Thursday 10-5.



Henry Opukaha'ia Scholarship Offering, Sunday February 26

Each year around the end of February, churches throughout the Hawaii Conference, United Church of Christ, collect the Henry Opukaha'ia Scholarship Offering. Henry Opukaha'ia was a young Hawaiian convert to Christianity who is credited for inspiring the first missionaries to sail to Hawaii from New England in the early 1800's. This offering goes into a fund to support clergy training by providing financial aid for seminary, postgraduate and continuing educational expenses. Appropriate programs include a seminary course of study, post-seminary studies or continuing education. We will collect the Henry Opukaha'ia Scholarship Offering on Sunday, February 26.

Shrove Tuesday/Mardi Gras/Pancake Supper/Fat Tuesday, February 28, 6:00 pm It is the day before Ash Wednesday marked by feasting and celebration before the observance of the Lent fast. Started in the Middle Ages, restricted and perishable food during Lent was all consumed on Shrove Tuesday to avoid spoilage and waste. Join us for a pancake supper.

Ash Wednesday, March 1

We mark Ash Wednesday as the first day of Lent. It follows Shrove Tuesday. It is traditionally a time of fasting and prayer in preparation for receiving or reaffirming baptism at Easter. We will begin the evening with a Soup Supper at 6 p.m. in Moore Hall and then move into the sanctuary at 7 o'clock for the service of the ashes. This year during Lent, we will reflect on the "Beatitudes" from the Gospel of Matthew. There are times in our lives when we do not feel very blessed. There are also people in the world who do not appear blessed at all. Yet, Jesus made it clear that every human life if blessed by God and every person deeply loved by God. We will begin on Ash Wednesday, March 1, with "Blessed are the poor in spirit." Each Sunday in Lent, we will focus on another type of person who is blessed by God, and at our reflection time on Wednesdays after our soup suppers, we will spend some time reflecting on the theme of the previous Sunday. This will allow us some time to let the message "settle in" and respond to it in our conversations. Please sign up if you would like to provide soup for dinner.
