A NOTE FROM KAHU AKANA

PHILOSOPHERS AND POETS

Dear Members and Friends of Kōloa Union Church:

I had a productive time on my two-week study leave in early October. It began with a reception and lecture from Dr. Susan Abraham, who is the new Vice-President of Academic Affairs and Dean of Pacific School of Religion. The title of her talk was "A New Moment for Religious Responsibility in the Public Sphere." She talked about the need for a more robust empathy and imagination in our teaching (and I believe she would say "in our preaching" as well). Dr. Abraham quoted Cornel West as she talked about our need to wed philosophy with poetry because the philosophers and poets "are the ones who have the courage to muster empathy and imagination in the face of the chaos that we find ourselves in, to create and use bits of the world in order to change the world in light of a new vision of the world." As I listened to Dr. Abraham and reflected on her lecture, I explored how I might be more courageous in my embrace of both philosophy and poetry in my ministry, including preaching, praying, writing, meeting, planning, and having conversations. I also considered how I might have more empathy and imagination in all of my life and ministry.

As I returned from my time in Berkeley and spent about a week and a half writing a book about my art, it occurred to me that the depth and challenges that emerge from my time at Pacific School of Religion as a Trustee of the school has had an impact on all of my life—without me ever being fully aware of it. For over a week after I returned, I wrote about the flowers of Hawai'i that I have been painting for over 24 years. At some point in 2018, I will have a book ready for publication that will be a result of not only decades of painting with watercolors but also of my personal, theological and spiritual journey (at least, that's where the book is currently headed). The time I have spent with theologians, philosophers, administrators, and artists, impacts all of the rest of my life—for the better—as I learn to have more imagination empathy. I hope you can say the same for the time you spend at church, as you worship, and work, and play, and plan, and talk, and dine with so many wonderful, smart, caring and creative people.



Update on Alan Akana Gallery

Another Note from Kahu

I would like to give everyone a brief update of the art gallery at the parsonage. In June, we had a neighbor complain to the Kaua`i County Planning Department that we were running a business out of a home that was zoned residential. I made an appointment to meet in person with the Planning Department in July and explained that the gallery has been a church fundraiser on church property since the beginning, and therefore should not be treated like a business. The officials I met with told me that no exchange of money can happen on any residential property without a permit, even though I pointed out that many of the churches on the island are zoned "residential" and exchange money on a regular basis. They ordered the church to take down the gallery signage and no longer exchange money on the premises until we went through a rather lengthy and expensive process to be permitted to run a business. The signs came down right away and our limited sales came through our online gallery through the gallery website. For nearly three months, our expenses (which mostly included insurance payments and fulfilling our advertising contracts), exceeded our income. Fortunately, our friend Norma Doctor Sparks, was doing research and talking to the County on behalf of the church throughout that time.

On September 29, we received permission from the County to reopen the gallery under church (not-for-profit) status and exchange money once again. We are also able to install permanent signage, which will focus on the parsonage and be historical / informational in nature, and will be purchased by the gallery. I will continue to give 51% of net profits to the church in order to pay for repairs and maintenance the parsonage, while the remaining 49% will eventually pay back my costs for getting the gallery up and running.

I am very excited to be able to once again have signage and sell art at the gallery! Sales have slowly picked up in October and we plan to make a profit again between now and Christmas. Please tell your friends about the gallery and consider Christmas gifts of framed art, posters and greeting cards this year. Our next big event will be a Black Friday Sale on November 24, the day after Thanksgiving, when everything in the gallery will be on sale. We will be looking for volunteers to help with treats and sit in the gallery during the day and assist with sales. Thank you for allowing me to have the gallery so that I can share my art with others; and thank you for all your support! Aloha nui loa!


Graceleanor Baird attended the Dedication/Celebration/lunch for the Baird Hall-Smith Lanai Extension at Waimea UCC.

Sanctuary Project


