A NOTE FROM KAHU AKANA Beauty, Art & Spirituality


At the February Board meeting of Pacific School of Religion, I gave the opening devotional. I shared with my fellow Trustees some of my thoughts about beauty and art, and how they have informed my spirituality. I also shared how they have formed us as a community of faith at Kōloa Union Church. I told them about the many talented artists in our midst who freely share their talents among us: painters, quilters, musicians, dancers, authors, floral arrangers, lei makers, interior designers, poets and prayers (to name just a handful!). I explained how I encourage art to enhance our worship services during the gift of music/dance, offertory, the lighting of advent candles, stewardship talks, presentation of quilts by our Prayers & Squares team.

After nearly 30 years of ordained ministry, I have come to believe that our art, our willingness to share it with others, and our appreciation and gratitude when it is shared, are among the strongest bonds that shape a community. Any time and any way we express ourselves creatively, we reflect the image of God. Any time we lovingly share what we create with others and any time we gratefully welcome it, we connect with others on a spiritual level. Perhaps it is in our artistic giving and receiving that we connect with God and others in the most profound ways. I think that is why every culture and every religion of which I am aware celebrates the art and affirms the artists in their midst.

When I was thinking about a theme for my upcoming sabbatical, "beauty, art and spirituality" popped into my head almost immediately. I want to explore some ways that others have experienced the sacred and a stronger sense of community through art. I also want to spend some time going deeper with my own creativity and consider ways that "the art within me" can be more fully expressed in our church. When I leave Kaua`i on March 4, I will spend three months focusing on this theme. I look forward to visiting places of beauty, art and spirituality all over southern France and in adjacent countries.

As I have mentioned before, a sabbatical is a time for both church and kahu "to reflect on our mutual ministry in Christ and how we can live more fully into our call as Christ's church." I look forward to spending the spring in southern Europe as I reflect on how beauty and art will enhance our mutual ministry, and then begin sharing with everyone on Sunday, June 9, when I return what I have discovered on my sabbatical.

PARKING REQUESTS

Church officially becoming an **Open and Affirming** Church. Look who



Debbie with Sean, Andy, Lea for dinner at Kiawe Roots. ALWAYS great having






